Knife Angel

The world-famous sculpture, the Knife Angel, is visiting Nuneaton in June (1st—30th), the latest stop in its nationwide tour. The 27-foot-tall sculpture, created by artist Alfie Bradley, is made from more than 100,000 blades and has stolen the limelight wherever it has gone. The Knife Angel specifically highlights the negative effects of violent crime while carrying with it messages of anti-violence, youth reconciliation and reducing knife crime.

Now Warwickshire Police and Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council, together with the Warwickshire Police Commissioner's Office and Warwickshire County Council, are to bring the creation to the Borough. The sculpture will be sited in Nuneaton town centre for a month.

Message tags will be available on market days between 10am until 2pm from the Nuneaton and Bedworth Safer Communities Partnership (NABSCOP) market stall, where, on Wednesdays, community safety items will also be given out.

Knife amnesty bins will be in place at various locations across the borough for people to anonymously dispose of knives or other

bladed items. The Knife Angel's time in the borough will culminate in a special vigil at the monument to remember those who have lost their lives to knife crime.

Anti-violence campaigner and Knife Crime Victim Support founder, Quinton Green, will be a special guest at this congregation of reflection which will take place on Thursday, June 29th at 6pm.



The arrival of the Knife Angel comes at a time when a special police operation, code-named 'Operation Outfitter', is due to be launched to tackle youth violence across the two towns.

Nuneaton and Bedworth Borough Council's deputy leader Councillor Clare Golby said the arrival of the monument, which was in neighbouring Coventry in 2019, forms a key part of work to tackle growing knife crime among young people in the borough.
